The trial lawyer presents his client's ever primarily through examination of witnesses. There are 2. however, certain rules and warrings that the advocate must always bear in mind when conducting examination-in-chienteross examination and re-examination of witnesses.

Discuss these rules and wonings showing the questioning techniques suitable in each case.

The trial lawyer owes various duties to the client, the court, the opposing counsel and witnesses. 3. In addition, as an officer of the court, the advocate is obliged to "at all times act freely and diligently in accordance with the law and recognized standards and ethics of the legal profession."
